Influenza Vaccinations

Ministry of Health have extended the funded influenza vaccination programme to August 31st

The eligibility criteria includes all pregnant women, those aged 65 and over, those aged 65 with a specified medical condition and children under 5 who have been hospitalised with, or who have a history of, a respiratory illness.

Measles Alert—still in place

There is still an alert in place regarding the recent measles outbreak.

The best protection against measles is the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine, which is fully funded. You need 2 doses of the vaccine to be fully immunised. If you were born after December 1968 check your vaccination status, as you may not be fully immunised. If you are not sure, please ring the practice and talk with one of the nurses. If you were born prior to 1969, you probably have a natural immunity.

Protecting yourselves and your family

The National Immunisation Service provides free immunisations against some diseases, however there are other non-funded vaccines that you can buy which may be worth considering:

Zostavax— Shingles is a viral infection, the first symptom of which is usually a sharp, tingling pain under the skin, followed by a red rash and blisters, it is extremely painful. Shingles is caused by the same virus as chicken pox. After a bout of chicken pox the virus lies latent in the nerve cells where it remains for life, it can reactivate as shingles.

Boostrix— is a combined adult vaccine against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus and is funded for children at 11 years of age and pregnant women between 28—38 weeks gestation. A booster is recommended for close adult contacts or new-borns i.e., grandparents and fathers (but not funded)

ADT (Adult Diptheria, Tetanus) - this vaccine is partially funded for those aged 45 and 65 years of age.

Varilix/Varivax — Chickenpox, also known as varicella, is most commonly seen in children. It is a highly infectious disease caused by the varicella zoster virus. After recovery from chickenpox the virus stays dormant (inactive) in the nerves near the spine. Years later the virus can become active again and cause herpes zoster which is also known as shingles.
